Toronto Railway Museum

The Museum never forgets IFRR and constantly keeps me informed of activities. The total amount of

information would take several issues of Smokestack alone so this must just be highlights.

Last summer saw the renewed mini train ride reopening for the Museum in Roundhouse Park. The picture shows one run through a leafy part of the park.



A whole range of lectures is offered relating to railway history in Canada. If they are current I'm happy to forward details to any IFRR members who contact me.

One of these online lectures in the series was on November 16 by Ryan Goldsworthy, Museum Director and Curator at the Royal Canadian Military Institute about Canadian Railway Troops. Later in November was the annual Museum Store Sunday. The Museum also launched a new Saturday Story Time program, which runs until December 30.

Roundhouse Park is an outdoor gallery space used to display the museum's collection of locomotives, rolling stock, and railway artifacts. It is a Toronto community space that is **accessible and free for everyone**, and is frequently animated through storytelling of Toronto's railway past, present, and future. There is a TRM volunteer team responsible for maintenance of the rolling stock. These consist of about twenty individuals with a passion for Toronto's railway history that they generously share with the community.

I make no apologies for continuing to one of my favourite Charities – the Railway Children. Supporting children in danger of abuse and trafficking from railway stations all over the world. My Rotary Club has supported recently.

As a supporter of Railway Children, I know the importance of us all playing our part to keep children safe and how, together, we form the essential eyes and ears that spot children at risk on the UK and other transport systems. But how much do you know about **why** children and young people are vulnerable, **what** has led them to run away, **how** they might be in danger and **where** we work? And, faced with a vulnerable young person at a UK train station, would you know what to do to ensure essential protection reaches them before an abuser can?

- 1. B. Every day, 28 children are found vulnerable and at risk on the UK rail network.*That's equivalent to a whole classroom of children every day, and over 10,000 a year
- 2. D. It's a common misconception that children run away because they have 'problematic behaviour'. This stigma blames the child for running away and can prevent them from getting the support or protection they need for any underlying issues.
- 3. A. According to government reports, 25% of children who go missing or run away are at risk of serious harm, including exploitation, violent crime or exposure to drugs and alcohol.
- 4. B. If you have concerns about a child travelling alone during unusual hours, always tell a member of rail staff or contact BTP on 0800 40 50 40 or 61016
- 5. A B & C. In fact, all three answers were correct signs of risk. Report your concerns to BTP by calling **0800 40 50 40** or texting **61016**.
- 6. A B & D. Railway Children have a Safeguarding on Transport programme and Safeguarding Action Groups at key stations across London, including Euston and Waterloo, to increase awareness of vulnerable children and young people on the transport network. Vice President Curtis tells me he rode on the Puffin' Billy outside of Melbourne, Australia in June after the RI Convention. (He and girlfriend Tara rode the city light rail from the main station in Melbourne (presumably Flinders Street) right to the PB Station in Belgrave!) They rode all the commuter rails in Melbourne and Sydney and visited the Australian National Railway Museum in Port Adelaide. In February, 2023 they also rode the TranzAlpine train from Greymouth (west coast of New Zealand) to Christchurch

through tunnels, Arthur's Pass and over viaducts.. including beautiful rivers and mountains, although not snow-capped in their summertime.

Later in the year they also visited the Heber Valley RR near Park City, Utah, the Nevada State RR Museum in Carson City and Railtown State Park in Jamestown, California which is operated by the California State Railroad Museum. They always find a reason every year to ride the Amtrak Pacific Surfliner down to Santa Barbara, Los Angeles or San Diego. The tracks run right next to the Pacific Ocean for two to three hours

of that trip - passing surfers, whales, vineyards and rolling hills as well as right through Vandenberg Space Force Base where SpaceX and the US government launch all the west coast missiles. A very active IFRR member – the joys of only being in your 70s!
